

KELLY GRACE THOMAS

Kelly Grace Thomas is the winner of the 2017 Neil Postman Award for Metaphor from Rattle, a 2018 finalist for the Rita Dove Poetry Award, a multiple Pushcart and Best of the Next nominee. Boat Burned, her first full-length collection, is forthcoming from YesYes Books in 2020. Kelly's poems have appeared or are forthcoming in: Best New Poets 2019, the Los Angeles Review, Redivider, Nashville Review, Muzzle, DIAGRAM, Glass: A Journal of Poetry and more. Kelly currently works to bring poetry to underserved youth as the Director of Education and Pedagogy for Get Lit-Words Ignite. She is the co-author of *Words Ignite*: Explore, Write and Perform, Classic and Spoken Word Poetry (Literary Riot). This textbook and curriculum is currently taught in the Los Angeles Unified School District using poetry to target English intervention skills. Kelly is a three-time poetry slam championship coach. She is passionate about helping others develop their voice. Through her work with Get Lit and beyond, Kelly has coached poets who have performed at Dodger Stadium, Library of Congress, The Gates Educational Conference ECET2 and the United Nations. She has helped edit and refine writing and performances prepared for icons such as Gloria Steinem, Maria Shriver, Tom's Shoes and more.

Kelly is also screenwriting partners with her sister Kat Thomas. Their screenplay, Magic Little Pills, a romantic comedy about a pyramid scheme, won Best Feature Length Screenplay at the Portland Comedy Film Festival. Together they also run Kat's food and travel blog, Edible Skinny as well as co-own the Zelda Fitzgeralds, a side-hustle, that features typewritten on-demand poetry business. Kelly lives in the Bay Area with her husband, Omid and is currently working on her debut novel, a YA thriller, titled *Only 10.001*.
